

EXPANDING THE RESPECTFUL MATERNITY CARE AGENDA

- Much work has been done on respectful maternity care and the importance of dignified care for pregnant and laboring women, including choice and informed consent
- Range of challenges, from individual provider behavior to health system deficiency and deviation from standards
- Newborns and children have unique needs for quality and respectful care:
 - Limited and non-verbal communication ability
 - Must have a parent/guardian consent for their care
 - May require urgent care/surgery in different ward than parent/guardian
 - Many shared rights with parent/guardian, but also independent rights as a child
 - May include multiple facilities (delivery, early PNC, late PNC)
 - May include need for bereavement care for family (stillbirth and neonatal death)
