## PROGRESS IN SCALING UP EARLY ESSENTIAL NEWBORN CARE IN WHO WESTERN PACIFIC REGION

#### WEBINAR - MONDAY 22 FEBRUARY 2021 AT 1 PM GMT

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Now, a newborn dies every four minutes in the Western Pacific Region accounting for half of all under-five deaths[1]. While this is a great improvement since 2012, many deaths remain due to preventable causes. The Regional Action Plan (2014-2020) aimed to reduce newborn mortality and had specific targets: 1) at least 80% of facilities where births take place are implementing early essential newborn care (EENC) and 2) at least 90% of births in subnational areas are attended by skilled health personnel. EENC aims to eliminate harmful practices that increase the risk of infection, hypothermia and death among newborns including unnecessary separations, suction and procedures.

The Regional Action Plan used a new coachingbased approach with an intensive focus on data to drive programming [2]. Dramatic progress, largely funded by countries in the region and delivered by local facilitators in existing systems, has resulted in significant and potentially sustainable practice improvements. Since 2014, an estimated 6017 facilities have begun implementing EENC across nine countries. Seven countries have achieved or are close to achieving the regional target of EENC introduction in at least 80% of childbirth facilities.
