





Evolution, implementation and progress: 2017–2020 report



- The report documents the evolution of the Network since its launch in 2017 and progress to date
- Describes the formation and operationalization of the Network, and how the Network catalysed the introduction and implementation of policy change, partner and resource alignment and learning at the country and global levels
- Shares examples of the Network country implementation progress on quality of care (QoC) for maternal, newborn and child health (MNCH)
- Reflects on successes and shortfalls during implementation of Network activities and identifies the levers of change that enhance quality of care implementation.





The Network: A broad-based partnership of committed governments, implementation partners and funding agencies aiming to implement and sustain QoC at scale

Ten Network countries: Bangladesh, Côte d'Ivoire, Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Kenya, Malawi, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Tanzania, Uganda


Vision: Every pregnant woman and newborn infant receives quality care throughout pregnancy, childbirth and the postnatal period, with equity and dignity

Goal: Reduce maternal and newborn deaths and stillbirths in participating health facilities by 50% over five years, and improve experience of care

LEARNING


Facilitate learning, share knowledge and generate evidence on quality of care



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Country progress and challenges: Leadership



- National QoC policy and strategy, and related QoC MNCH roadmaps successfully developed or updated by all countries
- QoC leadership structures successfully built in all countries
- National technical working groups (TWG) for QoC MNCH are operational

- More funding needed to scale up the implementation of QoC strategies and structures
- Tensions can arise between the new QoC structures and existing MNCH programmes due to absence of clarity on roles and responsibilities
- TWG coordination did not always lead to partners aligning QoC technical support objectives

- WHO MNH QoC standards adopted and adapted by all Network countries
- Diverse QoC intervention packages reflecting the country context and priorities
- Learning districts and facilities oriented in QoC with partner support
- District and facility implementation capitalizing and building on existing QI capacities

- It takes time to set up district and facility operations within existing government resources
- As QoC structures are still new, implementation requires partners' technical support, especially at sub-national level
- Building and sustaining QoC capabilities across all levels of the system will need time and resources
- Scaling up best practices will depend on these capacities across the system



- A set of common QoC MNCH indicators were agreed to be monitored and reported on by Network countries
- Progress is being made in establishing QI learning systems at facility levels
- Countries have made advancements in developing community engagement mechanisms and related accountability platforms

- Progress in documenting and sharing data varies across countries reflecting constraints of health information systems
- Institutionalization of learning systems depends on strengthening coordination between evidence-generation, policymaking and programmes
- Work needed to systematize and integrate community engagement for QoC and accountability processes

Reflections on quality of care measurement

- Countries' capacity to collect QoC data varies across indicators
- Stopgap measures are needed to help countries collect MNH QoC data in the short-term while investing in the long-term strengthening of the health information system
- Health information systems face structural and operational deficiencies which affects data quality, analysis and use
- Although it took a long time, countries are beginning to share common MNH QoC indicator data
- Districts and facilities need capacity-strengthening on QI data management, analysis and use
- Impact evaluations are needed to identify packages of interventions that have or have not led to significant impact for the purpose of scale up and sustainability

Emerging lessons: Leadership

It takes a whole health system to improve QoC

Government leadership and long-term commitment is a prerequisite for success

QoC requires dedicated and sustained investment and partnership





Emerging lessons: Action

Health systems operate in different contexts which impact the pace of QoC development, adaptation and implementation

Building QI capabilities is necessary for sustaining the provision of QoC





Emerging lessons: Learning

Designing, implementing and monitoring a comprehensive and adaptable QoC programme at the district or sub-national levels is critical

Documenting and sharing lessons from QoC initiatives can help build more effective programmes and it requires trust

A facilitated network offers a valid platform for rapid South-South learning and accelerated progress in QoC



Emerging lessons: Accountability

Engaging communities and stakeholders in designing and implementing QoC for MNH programmes paves the way to progress and ensures accountability for QoC

Investing early and intentionally in the development and strengthening of data systems for quality of care is essential

Demonstrating impact of QI activities takes time



Way forward for Network countries


- Commitment and engagement of governments and partners to sustain the gains made and reach targets
- Alignment of strategic investments and increased domestic resources to strengthen health systems foundations for QoC
- Updating of health information systems to reflect QoC metrics for MNCH
- Strengthening and scale up workforce competencies and capacities to address QoC
- Ensuring the systematic involvement of communities to improve QoC and strengthen accountability mechanisms
- Establishing links with academic institutions to support the development and implementation of a national learning platform for QoC
- Strengthening sub-national capacities for QoC and scaling up within countries and across programmes





Way forward for Network partners

- Continue to provide support for capacity building for quality of care, with a focus on sub-national level as a means for sustainability and scale up
 - Prioritize and align investments aiming to support national priorities on quality of care for MNCH, including strengthening health information systems
 - Evolve the normative guidance to reflect learning emerging from the Network
 - Support countries to conduct implementation research and impact evaluations to assess effectiveness of the implementation QoC MNH packages to inform scaling up
 - Use the lessons from QoC Network implementation to inform coordination and delivery of technical support to countries that reflects country leadership, priorities and partner alignment around the national strategy and plan
 - Expand the learning network beyond the Network countries

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


