Essential Newborn Care Course Second Edition (2022): Launch of the interim version

The World Health Organization in collaboration with partners are developing the second edition of the Essential Newborn Care Course (ENCC). The material provides the foundation for the essential care of every newborn: immediate care at birth, resuscitation when needed, breast milk feeding, thermal care, prevention of infection, recognition and response to danger signs.

This course is part of a set of WHO resources for improving care of newborns; <u>Human Resource</u>

<u>Strategies to improve newborn care in health facilities in low- and middle-income countries, Standards for improving quality of maternal and newborn care in health facilities and the <u>Standards for improving the</u> quality of care for small and sick newborns in health facilities.</u>

The second edition of ENCC is competency-based with new features & can be used for both in-service and pre-service settings, different course options, aligned with WHO standards with focus on the rights of newborns, nurturing care, and strengthened links to care in the community. The course materials encourage collection, analysis and use of data in quality improvement activities focused on essential newborn care. Educational methodologies incorporate active learning and structured simulations. The materials integrate existing newborn courses such as WHO Early Essential Newborn Care coaching and Helping Babies Breathe and Helping Babies Survive, which have been updated and aligned with WHO guidelines.

WHO, UNICEF and partners were able to conduct limited field testing with users due to travel and meeting restrictions during COVID-19 pandemic. Therefore, this version is released as an interim version for field testing in various settings, countries and regions in order to finalize and publish the 2nd edition of ENCC later in 2022.

Too few midwives and other health professionals are getting the education and training they need to provide quality, respectful care to pregnant women and their newborns & women needing family planning, treatment of sexually transmitted infections, safe or post abortion care, including perinatal mental health support. A key solution is to invest in the transformation of midwifery education through the first global Interprofessional Midwifery Education Toolkit. The "Toolkit" will bring together in one place education and training materials for maternal, newborn, sexual, reproductive and perinatal mental health for midwives, and others providing elements of midwifery care. The Essential Childbirth Care Course (ECBC) is focused on the midwifery model of care, which puts women, newborns and their families at the center, ensures continuity of care, and prevents unnecessary interventions, yet ensures lifesaving actions.

New Publications

WHO recommendations on maternal and newborn care for a positive postnatal experience

Most maternal and infant deaths occur in the first six weeks after childbirth, yet this remains a neglected time. Women and newborns require support and careful monitoring after birth.

On 30 March 2022, the World Health Organization launched the first global guidance on maternal and newborn care for positive postnatal experience. These new recommendations stress on urgency of both physical and mental health support in postnatal period. This guideline aims to improve the quality of essential, routine postnatal care for women and newborns with the ultimate goal of improving maternal and newborn health and well-being. It recognizes a "positive postnatal experience" as a significant end point for all women giving birth and their newborns, laying the platform for improved short- and long-term health and well-being.



A positive postnatal experience is defined as one in which women, newborns, partners, parents, caregivers and families receive information, reassurance and support in a consistent manner from

motivated health workers; where a resourced and flexible health system recognizes the needs of women and babies and respects their cultural context.

This is a consolidated guideline of new and existing recommendations on routine postnatal care for women and newborns receiving facility- or community-based postnatal care in any resource setting.

WHO/HRP special supplement on understanding mistreatment of women during childbirth to improve quality of care

A special WHO and HRP supplement was recently published by BMJ Global Health on women's experiences of mistreatment during childbirth. This supplement reiterates the need for high quality facility-based care that is respectful and people centered, as women across the world are still facing unacceptable mistreatment during childbirth. This experience is deeply affecting women's trust in facility-based care, has grave future health implications and can put the lives of women at risk.

The Network for Improving Quality of Care for Maternal, Newborn and Child Health (Quality of Care Network) works to ensure that every pregnant woman and newborn receives good quality care throughout pregnancy, childbirth and the postnatal period, with the ambitious goal to halve maternal and newborn deaths and stillbirths in health facilities within five years in the participating countries.

The Network is led by countries that are already taking leadership to improve quality of care in health services: Bangladesh, Côte d'Ivoire, Ethiopia, Ghana, India, Kenya, Malawi, Nigeria, Sierra Leone, Tanzania, and Uganda. More countries are expected to join the Network. It is backed by the World Health Organization, UNICEF and UNFPA, and supported by a growing partnership of development organisations, NGOs, professional associations and universities.

It is underpinned by the values of quality, equity and dignity and contributes to achieving the targets of the Every Woman Every Child Global Strategy for Women's, Children's and Adolescents' Health.
