Key recommendations on next steps for the Network

- The Network has served as a pathfinder in brining together health systems strengthening for QoC and programme implementation. It has demonstrated that QoC is a not only a goal but a fundamental function of the health system. This is a very important input for countries that are engaging in strengthening their PHC approach, or accelerating implementation of MNCH specific action plans (EPMM, ENAP, CS).
- The work has only started. Improving the quality of care in MNCH and QoC other technical areas is an ongoing task. The participation in the Network has catalysed this task.
- The Network has to continue to support the unfinished agenda of scaling up and scaling out QoC within and across countries. This momentum should not be lost.
- Countries are at different stages of QoC maturity and implementation agenda. Resources and domestic investment are needed to address health systems fundamental gaps and facilitate QoC implementation.
- Governments and partners, including international and country partners, must continue to invest to support the QoC network agenda, with a clear focus on ensuring the gains made so far are retained, while turning the attention towards strengthening the subnational and implementation levels.
- There are new aspects of work that directly relate to QoC: strengthening accountability, new models of health service redesign, involvement of the private sector, etc. that require attention, documented implementation and shared learning among countries.
- The country-driven learning is a unique platform for peer-to-peer learning. This is a precious achievement that should not be abandoned. It is difficult to conceive how such a learning could continue without being backed by a network of countries implementing QoC initiatives.
- The time is right to review the Network modalities, countries engagement, focus on technical areas, which should result in maintaining the Network's main objectives, the South-South cooperation approach of building on country experience with country leadership.

Network is relevant and with potential for impact

- Strategic objectives remain relevant:
 - Drive and incentivize the QOC implementation agenda
 - Bottom-up learning and countries moving together on the same path
 - Development of common language on QOC and implementation
- Unprecedented progress in institutionalizing leadership, accelerating action, improve measurement
- Real example of alignment: Agreement on priorities; Technical work, Partners
- A functional learning network fed by country real time learning and priorities

AND:

- Need to guide the scaling up within countries and across countries
- Need to scale out/integrate full continuum of MNCH
- More work to be done:
 - institutionalize learning and use learning to inform scaling up,
 - Institutionalize community engagement for quality

Recommendation of the independent review: Continue and adapt

CONTINUE

- Build on momentum
- Complete the unfinished agenda: QoC takes time
- Achieve the goal: SDGs by 2030: MMR, NMR, CM
- Address emerging priorities
- Continue the country engagement and support of current Network countries
- Proactively support demands from other countries to engage and follow on a similar path

AND:

- Adapt to the changing context
- Address need for more investment
- Scale up within and across countries
- Strengthen the implementation of QoC as part of ongoing initiatives : EPMM/ENAP/CSA

The partnership


- Driven by committed countries and partners working in partnership
- Striving to align priorities, develop a common language, fill TA gaps, advocate for more resources
- Proactively supports achievement of MNCH initiatives targets: ENAP, EPMM, CSA

Organizing the Network

- Network of countries and partners: Focus countries and new countries willing to engage
- At the country level: Focus in operationalizing LALA+ and scaling up, driven by MOH, supported by partners aligned to support one QoC roadmap to SDGs
- At the global level: Facilitated learning and sharing, TA coordination and support, Development of normative practice-based guidance
- Leadership group to exercise stewardship and accountability
- Partners group to align support and continue develop one QOC agenda
- A secretariat that facilitates the learning and coordination

Funding to support implementation

- Main investment: domestic investment and additional funding to country priorities (GFF)
- Catalytic funding to support learning and sharing within and across countries
